VALIANT left July 31st for their patrol in the Caribbean. It started as a slow patrol. Their first stop was Puerto Rico to visit a local orphanage where they helped clean the facilities. On their way, they generously opened their wallets and brought hundreds of dollars worth of food, diapers, and supplies for the orphanage.





Next stop was St. Kitts where they delivered a shipment of body armor donated by Miami-Dade Police Dept. The crew visited a center for troubled teens and shared some personal experiences with the teens and provided mentoring. While there they came across a puppy in need of a home. The newest crew member is named "Kitt".



What started as a slow patrol quickly took on an urgency with Hurricanes Irma and Maria. While worrying about their families in the path of IRMA, VALIANT was tasked with rescuing people from a nearly uninhabitable St. John island to a cruise ship in St. Thomas. They rescued 77 adults, 22 children, 11 dogs and 2 cats. They had a second day of rescues and then had to run from Maria.









Following Maria, the next mission was to conduct search and rescue, conduct port assessments and deliver relief supplies to St. Croix. I know their hearts are heavy with the task at hand. I'm sure they are thinking of those teens they met in St. Kitt and the staff and children at the orphanage in Puerto Rico. They've never served in a war zone, but I'm sure they feel like they are in one now. They were due home the end of September, but as of now they are staying as long as needed. BRAVO ZULU!!!

Expanding the National Flight Academy's Outreach by Captain John O'Hara, USN (Ret), Director of Education, National Flight Academy

hrough a generous donation from the Haugh Family Foundation, the National Flight Academy (NFA) was able to expand its outreach to students on the autism spectrum. NFA began this effort by collaborating with a local Autism Consultant (Chrissy Ogilvie, Ph.D., Autism Consultant FSU - Center for Autism and Related Disabilities) to create specialized training for the NFA staff regarding their interaction with autistic students. Staff were trained on the proper identification of traits, approach and mentorship of autistic students, as it relates to triggers, anxiety and social interaction. This training has allowed the staff of the National Flight Academy to interact and support the selected students in a positive and effective way. Furthermore, this training has allowed staff to better identify and implement best practices with students who are not part of this selected program, but who may demonstrate autistic behaviors and mannerisms.

With the help of Dr. Ogilive, 12 students were selected to participate in NFA's sixday Deployment program this summer. After touring NFA and seeing all of the "bells and whistles" that are normally part of the Deployment program, Dr. Ogilive was able to determine the level at which a student would need to function, in order to successfully complete the full program. In collaboration with a local Autism Consultant who works with a number of students in the community, students were selected based on their ability level in several areas of the program (noises, lights, program duration and educational difficulty).

In cooperation with Dr. Ogilive, an assessment tool was developed to give NFA the ability to evaluate the selected students on specialized criteria, specifically relevant to autistic students. The assessments of the students were compiled and a report generated with its results, after all students completed the six-day program. This data assisted in evaluating the overall effectiveness of the program, in regard to identified autism spectrum disorders.

Feedback from parents of students who attended this summer indicate that the effort to expand NFA outreach to students with autism was successful (see sidebar).

NFA is thrilled with this type of feedback. As a result, NFA plans to run three one-day Adventure programs in the Fall for students who do not have the ability to handle the various conditions of the six-day Deployment program, but who may greatly benefit from this unique educational environment.

We could also tell that she was motivated, learning and growing socially and emotionally. After graduation, as we were discussing her experience with Sarah, these were some of the comments we heard about Sarah's time on the National Flight Academy's Ambition:

· "I had a blast!"

This from a child that struggles daily in the traditional educational setting.

· "I volunteered to do the math calculations for my CAG."

This from a child with a diagnosed math disability. She volunteered to do math!

"I made new friends!"

This from a child that has difficulty making and keeping friends. The Squad formed a group via Social Media to stay in touch. We usually received at least one daily update as to what her NFA friends are up to.

And

• "I learned that I can do more than I thought I could!"

Only one word for this hard won and long-awaited lesson: "priceless!"

From another parent of a selected student:

"... It's been a week since Bryson attended and graduated from the National Flight Academy and I want to thank you and the sponsors for making it possible for Bryson to attend. Bryson had an awesome time, met new friends, gained new experiences and just had a great time. I realized that was the first time Bryson had been away from us and alone with strangers who became mentors and friends. I am elated about how Bryson is maturing and gaining milestones ..."

From the Director Captain Sterling G. Gilliam, USN (Ret)



Greetings Fly•By readers - I hope this note finds you well. We had a great summer here the Museum at with strong visitation numbers and a multitude of signifi-

cant events and major activities. Of note, the Blue Angels practices have been a big hit and we have had tens of thousands on our flight-line to enjoy their 2017 warm-ups.

Our busy pace continues unabated this Fall. In the last issue, I detailed that a key part of our vision going forward is to place a renewed focus on our active duty Navy, Marine Corps and Coast Guard Aviation team. To that end, we were honored to recently host the U.S. Navy Landing Signal Officer School's annual Operators Advisory Group (OAG). With the best attendance in years, LSOs from around the fleet, along with representatives from Naval Air Systems Command and industry, participated in the three-day OAG to discuss the Navy's future in the areas of optical landing systems, catapults and arresting gear. It was a great opportunity for our staff to see how the aircraft carrier flight decks might operate for the next several decades.

In keeping with the theme of more focus on today's active duty force, I want to take this opportunity to give you a sneak preview of our next major Museum project - the USS

Nimitz (CVN-68) Flight Deck Exhibit. With design collaboration and funding graciously provided by our Foundation, this exhibit's scope will be along the same lines as our iconic USS Cabot (CVL-28) wooden flight deck located in the West Wing. The concept calls for converting the floor of the quarterdeck area just to the right of the Museum entrance into a massive ¼ scale replica of a Nimitz-class aircraft carrier flight deck (see drawing below).

Stretching almost 70' in width and more than 160' in length, while covering more than 7,000 square feet, this exhibit will link nicely with the recently completed CVN-68 Giant Screen Theater ticket counter (right).

While the project is still in the final design stages, we are excited about what this exhibit will bring as it will give our arriving visitors an immediate sense of where our sailors and aircrew work around the world every day as they maintain and operate naval aircraft off the ten Nimitzclass carriers we have in service today.




